New Rochelle Mayor Yadira Ramos-Herbert Delivers Inaugural State of the City Address



New Rochelle Mayor Yadira Ramos-Herbert delivered her first State of the City Address last month to a crowd at the Remington Boys & Girls Club.

Mayor Ramos-Herbert is the 24th mayor of the City of New Rochelle, serving the people of the city as the first woman and person of color mayor since her inauguration in 2024. From 2020–2023 she served as a member of the New Rochelle City Council, representing District 3.

Focusing first on the City's strong economic landscape, Ramos-Herbert pointed to the City's development pipeline as generating millions in revenue over the next 20 years, noting that as a result of the

City's development program, undeveloped lots, "will now generate \$260 million dollars in revenue over the same period of time allowing us make much-needed investments in our City." Pointing to the innovative form-based zoning that allowed for such increased growth, the City is, "able to optimize the downtown revitalization while also actively increasing revenue in a manner that does not require an increase in property taxes."

Ramos-Herbert noted that the city, to date, has authorized the development of 10,000 residential units and 400 residential condominiums, with 65% of units already online and a leasing rate of 84%. Of

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
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

League of Women Voters of New Rochelle Celebrates Centennial Year

On March 26, approximately forty members and friends of the League of Women Voters of New Rochelle gathered at the New Rochelle Public Library to begin a yearlong celebration of the LWVNR's 100th birthday. The opening reception included an exhibition of League historic memorabilia curated by the library's archivist David Rose and an historical talk by Mr. Rose.

The exhibit, Rose explained, documents the history of the League's mission to educate the public about the importance of voting, the electoral process, election reforms, and active participation in government. The archived material on display included meeting minutes of the Executive Board, educational literature, voters' guides, correspondence, and scrapbooks. Assisting Rose in creating the exhibit were Tobe Sevush, Programming Coordinator for the library; Ann Gombiner, New Rochelle High School student; and Leona Newman, LWVNR board member.

The League of Women Voters of the United States was founded in 1920, six months before the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution gave women the right to vote. founder of the national League, moved to New Rochelle and founded the LWVNR in 1924. Her home on Paine Avenue is now privately owned but features a commemorative plaque on the front lawn.

The mission of national, state, and local Leagues is to promote informed citizen participation in government. A nonpartisan organization that is not for women only, the LWVNR gets out the vote, sponsors candidate forums, publishes voters guides online, and studies and takes positions on civic issues.

The Encyclopedia Britannica describes the League as "one of the largest nonpartisan political organizations in the United States and one of the only such organizations that successfully provides broad comprehensive information on a wide variety of political issues."

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Resolution Adopting SEQRA Findings Statement Relative to Lincoln Neighborhood District Passed

New Rochelle Mayor Yadira Ramos-Herbert convened the April 16th City Council RLM, beginning with Approval of Minutes, Submission of Minutes and Consent Agenda.

Councilman Albert Tarantino posed a question regarding Consent Agenda Item 2, Proposed Adoption of the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) Findings Statement and Downtown Overlay Zone (DOZ) Amendments, adopting SEQRA Findings Statement relative to the Lincoln Neighborhood District, including changes to DOZ.

"[Regarding] Item Number 2, brought up last week about the sheer size of DOZ in proportion to amount of units allowed to be built, how does that work if we wanted to add more units in that hospital area with its massive parking lots that could gobble up units. What we don't want to happen is that the Lincoln Avenue corridor comes along and there are no units left," Tarantino asked.

"We did an analysis when we adopted the zoning of the parcels around the hospital," Commissioner of Development Adam Salgado answered. "We determined that 400 of them could be accommodated around the 654 units so there would still be units for other parcels in the DOZ. Additionally, the hospital included in the Downtown Overlay 8 (DO 8) is a good thing. What is unique about the DO 8, it requires the fees that are generated be reinvested into the community."

Ramos-Herbert requested that Salgado describe how in theory to add additional units to the DOZ. "Each of those uses that are described in the theoretical development scenario have different impacts in the environment," Salgado replied. "We look at traffic, stormwater, impact on the sewers. We would amend the SEQRA to get approval by the State."

Next, Council moved to establish June 8th each year as "Thomas Paine Day."

In other business, a Special Meeting was held on April 9th, addressing the resignation, separation agreement and release of claims between the City and City Manager Kathleen Gill. Department of Public Works (DPW) Commissioner Wilfredo Melendez was appointed Acting City Manager.

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these units, approximately 1,288 units are designated affordable.

As housing needs increase across the state, said Ramos-Herbert, "We're building for the people of New Rochelle...with our designation last month as a Pro-Housing Choice Community, the City of New Rochelle is now eligible to apply for programs that are part of \$650 million in State funding that is available, supporting the City's commitment to responding to the housing shortage New Yorkers are facing."

Due to its strong economic landscape, Ramos-Herbert went on to address the City's response to climate change and environmental concerns, including flood mitigation efforts and green infrastructure projects, "The City identified more than 100 projects totaling \$350 million aimed at addressing and alleviating the widespread flooding that has adversely affected our community."

Looking beyond the city center, Ramos-Herbert brought attention to the City's largest investment: its people. Through a multifaceted and collaborative effort with, "entities such as the School District, Boys and Girls Club, Iona University, Monroe College, and the Community Justice Center, over \$6.7 million has been dedicated to nurturing our future leaders."

Support for small businesses has also skyrocketed in recent years as the city generated multiple events and activations for existing and emerging business owners to showcase and grow their companies like the New Rochelle Street Fair, Holiday Market and Taste of Union. Ramos-Herbert celebrated the multitude of city-sponsored grants, "to restore and renovate commercial storefronts as renovated facades stabilize property values and leverage new

investment in businesses and the neighborhood."

In celebration of ongoing downtown revitalization efforts, Ramos-Herbert noted that the City has received \$41.7 million in grants to support the development of the LINC – a plan to right-size Memorial Highway and transform it from a six-lane road into a local street and linear park, reconnecting the historically neglected and fragmented Lincoln Avenue neighborhood to the City's economic center. "The LINC will create safe, attractive pedestrian crossings, bike lanes, and new recreation and park space to help surrounding residents and business owners benefit from the downtown revitalization and economic growth."

In line with ongoing infrastructure improvements, the City's future also includes a robust, once in a lifetime renovation of the New Rochelle train station to improve connections to the downtown, pedestrian safety and create access to local businesses, "In just a few short years, New Rochelle will be the first Metro North stop in Westchester County to provide direct access to Penn Station."

Ramos-Herbert praised the contributions of various municipal departments and their dedication to serving the community and emphasized the importance of collaboration and teamwork in achieving the City's goals, including the work of New Rochelle's First Responders, Office of Parks and Recreation and Department of Buildings.

"Let us embrace the promise of progress, the pursuit of excellence, and the power of collaboration," concluded Ramos-Herbert. "Together, we will start New Rochelle's next chapter charting a course towards a future where prosperity is not just a vision, but a reality for every citizen."

City of New Rochelle Announces Leadership Update

At a Special Session of the New Rochelle City Council on April 9, the City Council voted to approve New Rochelle City Manager Kathleen Gill's resignation. City Manager Gill's last day was effective, April 9, 2024.

"Kathleen Gill has submitted her letter of resignation in order to pursue other opportunities. She is grateful for her 27 years of service to the City of New Rochelle and is proud to have worked with so many hard-working and dedicated City employees. We thank Kathleen for her service to the City of New Rochelle and wish her the best in her future endeavors. As we

begin the search for her successor, the City of New Rochelle remains committed to a comprehensive and transparent search process to identify the next City Manager," said New Rochelle Mayor Yadira Ramos-Herbert.

The City of New Rochelle will enlist an executive search firm to conduct a nationwide search, with the process to retain the search firm to begin immediately. Pursuant to the City Charter, Deputy City Manager Adam Salgado will serve as Acting City Manager.

The injuries were deemed serious, but not life threatening at the time. New Rochelle Detectives responded to the Bronx to meet with victim who ended up not fully cooperating with them. Patrol Officers and Detectives responded to Lit Sports Lounge and Grill and were able to find a small crime scene outside the premises that was then processed.

This is an active investigation, and Detectives are developing leads and are asking that anyone with information on this incident call the New Rochelle Police Department at 914-654-2300.

TRESPASS PUBLIC LEWDNESS

On April 10th, 2024, at about 10:48pm, New Rochelle Detectives arrested one Lidio Garcia, 25 years of age, of New Rochelle for Trespassing and Public Lewdness stemming from multiple previous incidents. It had been reported in two previous incidents that Garcia is alleged to have attempted entry into a home on Mayflower Avenue occupied by college students. On one of those occasions the residents confronted him, at which time he exposed his genitalia before leaving the area. Detectives were able to develop leads that culminated in an arrest at Police Headquarters.

UNLAWFUL SURVEILLANCE ARREST

On Thursday April 18th, 2024, at about 4:00pm, New Rochelle Detectives concluded an investigation with the arrest of one Hussain A. Haider, a 23-year-old male, of New Rochelle. On March 8th, 2024, Haider is alleged to have approached a woman wearing a Niqab (a long garment worn by some Muslim women that covers the entire body and face, excluding their eyes) and took a photograph under the Niqab and further exposed himself to her before fleeing the area. The victim's young child was also present during the incident. Detectives were able to develop leads and with the help of the Westchester County Police Real Time Crime Center and New York State Probation, were able to arrest Haider without incident at New Rochelle Police Headquarters.

ARRESTED: Hussain A. Haider, 23 years of age, of New Rochelle.

CHARGES: New York State Penal Laws: 250.45 Unlawful Surveillance 2nd Degree - E Felony; 130.52 Forcible Touching - A Misdemeanor; and 260.10 Endangering the Welfare of a Child - A Misdemeanor.

WEAPONS CAR STOP

On April 6th, 2024, at about 1:32am, New Rochelle Police conducted a traffic stop at 710 Main Street for a New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law violation – passing through a steady red traffic light. The vehicle was found to have a fraudulent temporary tag instead of a properly registered license plate and was subsequently impounded. During a search of the vehicle, a 9mm Ruger handgun with a large capacity magazine was found within the vehicle. After further investigation both the driver and passenger were charged with possessing the weapon.

CHARGES: Both parties were charged with New York State Penal Law: Section 265.03 Criminal Possession of a Weapon 3nd Degree – C Felony; Section 265.35 Unlawful Possession of a Large Capacity Feeding Device – A Misdemeanor Mr. Rivera-Ramos was also charged with: Section 170.25 Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument 2nd Degree – D Felony.

New Rochelle Man Sentenced to 21 Years in Prison for Sex Offenses Involving Three Children in County

Westchester County District Attorney Miriam E. Rocah announced last month that a New Rochelle man was sentenced to 21 years in state prison for sexual acts involving three children in Westchester County, as well as for the possession and creation of images and videos of children engaged in sexual acts, between 2019 and 2023.

DA Rocah said: "After years of preying upon children and inflicting unspeakable trauma on his victims, this defendant has been brought to justice and removed from our community. I thank the brave survivors for their courage in working with our Office, and the multiple agencies who partnered with us on this case to secure this conviction. We will continue to support the victims throughout their healing and offer further assistance in any way possible."

The defendant, Jason Ricketts, 23, pleaded guilty on Jan. 29 to two counts of Course of Sexual Conduct Against a Child in the First Degree, Criminal Sexual Act in the Second Degree, and Promoting an Obscene Sexual Performance by a Child, all felonies.

The defendant appeared before New York State Supreme Court Judge James McCarty and was also sentenced to 20 years of post-release supervision. He is also required to register as a sex offender.

The defendant first met his victims in person at locations where children gather and befriended them by deceiving the children and their parents into believing that he was younger than he was. The defendant methodically gained the trust of his victims, even using substances with them before engaging in sexual acts with his victims, which he filmed. When the victims tried to leave or stop engaging, the defendant indicated that he would post the videos and images to social media accounts.

The sexual abuse began in 2019, when the victims were 12 years old, and continued until 2023.

The DA's Office Cyber Crimes Bureau and High Technology Crimes Unit launched an investigation in October 2022 after Dropbox Inc., a file hosting service, filed a CyberTipline Report with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) about an uploaded video file containing minors engaged in sexual acts.

Upon receiving NCMEC's notification, the New York State Police developed a suspect in Westchester County and the DA's Office obtained a search warrant in January 2023 for the defendant's residence in New Rochelle.

With assistance from the New Rochelle Police Department, the DA's Office investigators seized multiple devices from the defendant's home. The defendant admitted to using Drophox.

Subsequent forensic analysis of the defendant's phone revealed a photo vault disguised as a calculator app containing dozens of videos and photos of the defendant performing sexual acts on children, which led investigators to identify three child victims in Westchester County.

The Child Abuse Bureau and the Special

Prosecutions Unit located the three minors and their families, who agreed to work with the DA's Office

The DA's Office arrested the defendant on Feb. 2, 2023, and seized an additional device, which revealed internet searches regarding how to remotely wipe devices, whether a person's age can be determined through a video, and attorneys who specialize in defending individuals charged with sex offenses.

The defendant has remained in custody at the Westchester County Jail since his arrest.

John Shehan, Senior Vice President of the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children (NCMEC) Exploited Children Division & International Engagement said: "In 2023, NCMEC received more than 36 million reports of suspected child sexual exploitation and made them available to law enforcement. The staggering volume of reports underscores the pressing need for ongoing collaboration in a shared mission to safeguard children and ensure a safer online environment.

NCMEC applauds the relentless efforts of the Westchester County District Attorney's Office and collaborating law enforcement agencies for their hard work on this case and commends the bravery of the survivors who have courageously come forward."

Steven G. James, New York State Police Superintendent said: "Mr. Ricketts had no regard for the wellbeing of the victims in this case. The evidence gathered, and work done by the New York State Police and our law enforcement partners, ensures the defendant will serve time for his deplorable acts. We have zero tolerance for those who prey on innocent children. This sentencing reflects the severity of the crimes committed and our commitment to finding justice for our most vulnerable victims."

Robert Gazzola, New Rochelle Police Department Commissioner said: "The collaborative efforts between multiple agencies in Westchester County have culminated in the successful arrest and prosecution of Jason Ricketts, who has been sentenced to 21 years in prison. This outcome reflects the dedication and synergy of our law enforcement community in upholding justice and safeguarding our neighborhoods."

In a statement to the court, one victim stated: "I met you when I was 8 years old, and then you became a constant in my life when I was 11 years old.... You stole years of my life from me. Not only did your actions affect me, but you affected others who once called you their friend; but you weren't really a true friend, you were a wolf in sheep's clothing a predator. You deserve all the time in prison you're getting; you need to be far away from kids."

Addressing the defendant, a second victim added, "You are a disgusting human being. You took away years of my life that I can't get back. I wish every day that I never met you. I was 12 years old...I would walk around afraid all the time. Every time I tried to make a new friend, you would blackmail me and try to scare me. I am not afraid of you anymore. After today, I hope I never see you again."

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Two Qualify for International Science Fair

Two New Rochelle High School science research students have qualified to compete in the world's largest high school STEM competition, the Regeneron International Science and Engineering Fair (ISEF) to be held in Los Angeles in May.

Junior Karun Kulamavalavan (left) and senior Imaad Uzun earned their entry for the prestigious event at the Westchester Science and Engineering Fair (WESEF) at Somers High School last month, which drew more than 700 participants from 42 Westchester and Putnam high schools.

Competing in the fields of Plant Sciences and mathematics respectively, Karun and Imaad each earned the Grand Prize in their categories. Karun explored the effect of salt on seagrass, an important marine plant in restoring damaged habitats.

Just 20 WESEF students advanced to ISEF where 1,800 science fair winners from more than 75 countries will compete for scholarships, tuition grants, internships, scientific field trips, and monetary awards. Imaad and Karun are the fifth and sixth New Rochelle High School students to ever qualify for ISEF.

The Science Research Program at New Rochelle High School is a three-year, college-level course where students research a topic of their choice.

Imaad Uzum said his research this year reminded him of "the value of solving problems myself." He was surprised by his WESEF win. "I was doubtful about it beforehand because I don't know anyone who has gone to ISEF for math from WESEF, but it turns out doing a math project was a risk worth taking," he said. The experience helped him decide to focus on math in college.

"I'm feeling great about going to ISEF! I think more than anything, it'll be a fun trip that will serve as a great experience to wrap up my high school career. I

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Treasures from the Westchester County Historical Society Exhibit on Display at New Rochelle Public Library

In celebration of the 150th Anniversary of the Westchester County Historical Society (WCHS), a digital exhibit featuring treasures from the WCHS collection will be traveling throughout the county to various public venues. A sampling of the Society's vast holdings, the exhibit's images are in a looped slideshow that reflects various eras and geographical areas of the county. The exhibit will be on display at the New Rochelle Public Library through May 6, 2024.

The eleventh oldest county historical society in America, WCHS is primarily a library and research center. The non-profit organization is located in the West-chester County Records Center in Elmsford, where the county's public records and archives are also housed. The work of the professionally-run WCHS library falls into three categories: acquisition of new materials, processing, and preserving the library's collections, and providing public access those WCHS collections. Documents, maps, photographs, manuscripts, books and other materials have been collected since the inception of WCHS, the only history organization that is steward of materials representing all of Westchester. The collec-



tion of over a half million materials are preserved in 10,000 square feet of state-of-the-art, temperature controlled vaults, on shelves equivalent to the length of 215 football fields. WCHS continues to add new materials to the library by gift, purchase, and long-term loan.

Additional 150th Anniversary events showcasing the work of the society and Westchester's extraordinary heritage include a county-wide family 150th History Hunt and a public presentation and birthday party in October.

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Richard Gephardt, Former U.S. House Majority Leader, to Deliver Iona University Commencement Keynote

Former United States Congressman and House of Representatives Majority Leader Richard (Dick) Gephardt will deliver the keynote address and be awarded an honorary degree at Iona University's 80th annual Commencement ceremony on May 17, 2024

"Iona University is pleased to welcome Dick Gephardt as this year's keynote speaker," said Iona President Seamus Carey, Ph.D. "Throughout his career in Congress and beyond, Dick has demonstrated the highest commitment to democratic citizenship and integrity. He has been an influential supporter of Iona University, and I can see his address will be well-received by our students, faculty, and Iona community."

Gephardt served for 28 years in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1977 to 2004, representing Missouri's 3rd Congressional District, home to his birthplace of St. Louis. He was elected to serve as House Democratic leader for more than 14 years, including as majority leader from 1989 to 1995 and minority leader from 1995 to 2003.

In his leadership roles, Gephardt emerged as one of the leading strategists of the Democratic Party's platform and chief architect of landmark reforms ranging from health care, pensions, education, energy independence and trade policy. He also ran as a Democratic presidential candidate twice, in 1988 and 2004.

Gephardt retired from the U.S. Congress in 2005 to establish the Gephardt Group, a privately held labor relations consulting and government affairs firm.

"I am honored to be named Iona University's keynote speaker at this institution of higher learning's 80th commencement ceremony," Gephardt said.

Most recently, Gephardt was a member of the Board of Directors of the Centene Corporation, the Ford Motor Company, Spirit AeroSystems, the U.S. Steel Corporation and the Washington Center for Intern-

ships and Academic Seminars and was chair of the Board of Trustees of the Scripps Research Institute, a private, nonprofit research organization engaged in basic biomedical science.

In addition, he is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and is the founder of the Gephardt Institute for Civic and Community Engagement at Washington University in St. Louis.

Widely known for his advocacy for international human rights, Gephardt served as chairman of the National Endowment for Democracy, a private, nonprofit organization that endeavors to strengthen democratic institutions around the world through nongovernmental efforts, from 2009 to 2013.

Gephardt earned his Bachelor of Science from Northwestern University in 1962 and his juris doctorate from the University of Michigan Law School in 1965.

"It was a wonderful evening of fun and learning through STEAM activities," said STEAM teacher Terri Agravat.






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Senior Recognized for Volunteer Work

Third Graders Simulate Polar Bear Conundrum



Third Graders in Tracy Visceglia's class at Ward School recently participated in a multi-day transdisciplinary STEAM experience surrounding the investigation of polar bears and their changing habitats.

Working with Instructional Technology Facilitator Jeannine Shields, the students participated in an archived virtual field trip from Discovery Education, hearing from scientists working with Polar Bears International in Churchill, Manitoba, Canada. Students observed footage and photos of polar bears, noticing which behaviors help them survive in their habitats, and responding to the scientists' questions about myths and facts.

Mrs. Visceglia also shared travel photos and videos from her husband's visit a year be-

fore to this polar bear region.

Students tracked their thinking digitally, distinguishing their predictions and revising their thinking after hearing from the experts.

In an exercise to illustrate shrinking polar bear habitat, the students placed themselves in the role of a polar bear standing on sea ice. Using a room immersion, with tablecloths representing water and white paper representing sea ice, students were able to model polar bear behaviors. They attempted to reach for pictures of seals, a main source of food for polar bears. As the sea ice shrunk, the ability to capture seals became more difficult. This helped students understand the predicament of polar bears in their changing environment.
